<p><b>Spoken Language</b></p> <p>Pupils should be taught to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>listen and respond appropriately to adults and their peers</li><li>ask relevant questions to extend their understanding and knowledge</li><li>use relevant strategies to build their vocabulary</li><li>articulate and justify answers, arguments and opinions</li><li>give well-structured descriptions, explanations and narratives for different purposes, including for expressing feelings</li><li>maintain attention and participate actively in collaborative conversations, staying on topic and initiating and responding to comments</li><li>use spoken language to develop understanding through speculating, hypothesising, imagining and exploring ideas</li><li>speak audibly and fluently with an increasing command of Standard English</li><li>participate in discussions, presentations, performances, role play, improvisations and debates</li><li>gain, maintain and monitor the interest of the listener(s)</li><li>consider and evaluate different viewpoints, attending to and building on the contributions of others</li><li>select and use appropriate registers for effective communication.</li></ul>		
<p><b>Reading – word reading</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words until automatic decoding has become embedded and reading is fluent</li><li>• read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially recognising alternative sounds for graphemes</li><li>• read accurately words of two or more syllables that contain the same graphemes as above</li><li>• read words containing common suffixes</li><li>• read further common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word</li><li>• read most words quickly and accurately, without overt sounding and blending, when they have been frequently encountered</li><li>• read aloud books closely matched to their improving phonic knowledge, sounding out unfamiliar words accurately, automatically and without undue hesitation</li></ul>		

- re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading.

### **Reading – comprehension**

Pupils should be taught to:

- develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:
- listening to, discussing and expressing views about a wide range of contemporary and classic poetry, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently
- discussing the sequence of events in books and how items of information are related
- becoming increasingly familiar with and retelling a wider range of stories, fairy stories and traditional tales
- being introduced to non-fiction books that are structured in different ways
- recognising simple recurring literary language in stories and poetry
- discussing and clarifying the meanings of words, linking new meanings to known vocabulary
- discussing their favourite words and phrases
- continuing to build up a repertoire of poems learnt by heart, appreciating these and reciting some, with appropriate intonation to make the meaning clear
- understand both the books that they can already read accurately and fluently and those that they listen to by:
- drawing on what they already know or on background information and vocabulary provided by the teacher
- checking that the text makes sense to them as they read and correcting inaccurate reading
- making inferences on the basis of what is being said and done
- answering and asking questions
- predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far
- participate in discussion about books, poems and other works that are read to them and those that they can read for themselves, taking turns

and listening to what others say

- explain and discuss their understanding of books, poems and other material, both those that they listen to and those that they read for themselves.

### **Writing – transcription**

Pupils should be taught to spell by:

- segmenting spoken words into phonemes and representing these by graphemes, spelling many correctly
- learning new ways of spelling phonemes for which one or more spellings are already known, and learn some words with each spelling, including a few common homophones

- learning to spell more words with contracted forms
- learning to spell common exception words
- apply spelling rules and guidance
- write from memory simple sentences dictated by the teacher that include words using the GPCs, common exception words and punctuation taught so far.

- distinguishing between homophones and near-homophones
- learning the possessive apostrophe (singular) [for example, the girl's book]
- add suffixes to spell longer words, including –ment, –ness, –ful, –less, –ly
- write from memory simple sentences dictated by the teacher that include words using the GPCs, common exception words and punctuation taught so far.

### **Handwriting**

- form lower-case letters of the correct size relative to one another
- start using some of the diagonal and horizontal strokes needed to join letters and understand which letters, when adjacent to one another, are best left unjoined
- write capital letters and digits of the correct size, orientation and relationship to one another and to lower case letters
